

Jive Records. They have expressed to me that they consider themselves to be messengers. They are not creating the violence, they're reporting on it. This is life as they live it and they feel that it's of interest to their own community. In their own community it's not shocking, it's not unique, it's not terrifying. That is what people are dealing with on a daily basis. When it gets into the mainstream it becomes interesting. Middle class white kids are dressing in the rappers' styles and playing their music at sweet sixteen parties and bar mitzvahs. There's no way that rap is dead, my guess is that it's very much here to stay."

Also at this meeting **Chris Montan**, Sr. VP Music, Walt Disney Studios, had the following to say about "The Highway": "What if we spend a lot of money with the phone company and then find out two years later that you can do it with a little satellite disk rather than cable? Disney has decided instead they're going to make twice as many movies as they used to, figuring that somebody's going to have to be able to program these things."

September, 1994 - The topic was "The Internet: @Superhighway for Songs?" **Geoff Berkin**, partner at Manatt, Phelps & Phillips noted that "The Internet today is like the wild west. It's sort of lawless partly because some people don't know what the law is, some people don't care what the law is and some people try to enforce the law but are unsuccessful at it." Berkin went on to remark, "People believe that what they think is the law is the law, even though they're incorrect." Finally Berkin predicted that after a few lawsuits mass uploading of copyrighted material would stop.

Addressing the potential to use the Internet as a promotion tool, **Luke Wood**, director of marketing at Geffen/DOC Records said "In June we put an entire unreleased track from Aerosmith that people were able to download for free on the Compuserve. Over 10,000 people downloaded the entire song in six days."
